The Club resolved that we should respond in a meaningful manner and that we should do this through

ShelterBox. This charity which is well known to Club Members was quick to respond to both crises. They had teams in both the Caribbean and Bangladesh assessing local needs and arranging for aid to be distributed. For the Caribbean this included tents, ShelterKits, solar lights and water carriers.
